About Queensland Community Foundation

Queensland Community Foundation (QCF) was established by The Honourable Mike Ahern in 1997 as a public charitable trust. We work with donors to achieve a constructive, long-lasting impact for the charities or charitable causes they wish to support.

All donated funds are invested in perpetuity to provide long-term benefits and donors can grant income to their nominated cause. As an umbrella trust, we take care of all compliance, due diligence and administration measures.

Our regional committees assist with supporting charitable causes throughout Queensland. Donations to our three regional sub-funds – in Toowoomba, the Gold Coast and the Sunshine Coast – allow people and organisations to support charities and community causes that directly benefit these regions.

Since inception 20 years ago, our fund has given back over \$20 million to support causes such as arts and culture, children and youth, community and disability services, education, indigenous, health and medical research, religion, environment, and animal welfare.

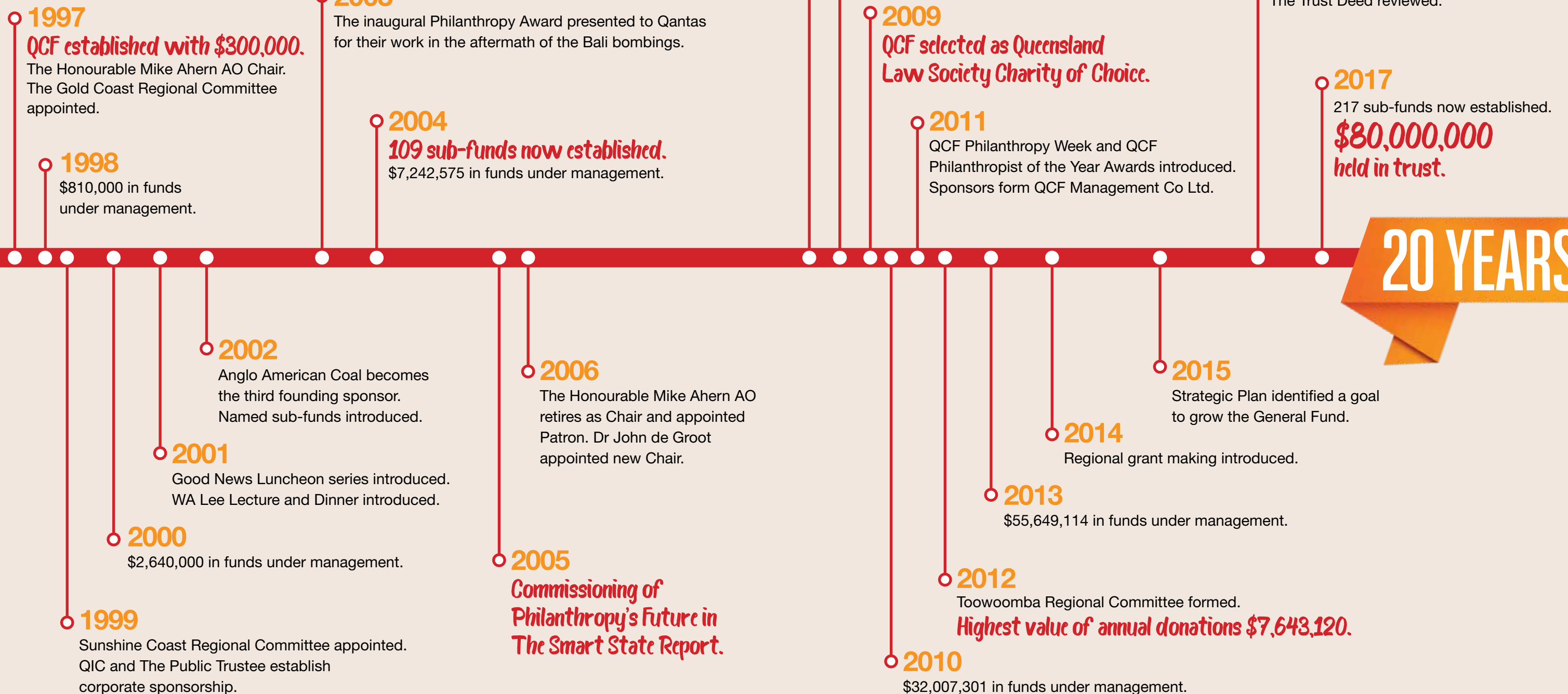

Trustee's Report

This year marked the 20th anniversary of Queensland Community Foundation (QCF). Reflecting on the vision held by our founder, The Honourable Mike Ahern AO, the Foundation is on track to fulfil its charter of providing an enduring income stream for charitable purposes.

With over \$20 million distributed in this time, and closing out the year with a corpus of \$80.7 million, it is testament to the generosity of everyday Queenslanders.

2016-2017 brought about a number of changes to QCF. The QCF Trust Deed was amended to bring it into line with legislative requirements, as determined by the Australian Taxation Office and Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission.

A comprehensive review of the QCF investment strategy was undertaken in consultation with an independent advisor and QIC Limited, which resulted in a change of investment strategy in March 2017. The Public Trustee believes this change will deliver a better risk/return outcome.

This year saw the end of QCF's long-term sponsorship from Anglo American Coal. We thank them for their support over the years, both financial and in kind, and recognise their contribution in cementing QCF as the only inclusive statewide community foundation.

At Board level, Dr John de Groot retired from the position of Chair, but remains on the Board as a member. On behalf of the Board, I extend my thanks to John for his commitment and service to this role for 10 years.

The Public Trustee was proud to once again be involved in QCF's Philanthropy Week through its QCF Philanthropy in Focus Photo Challenge partnership and its sponsorship of the QCF Community Philanthropist of the Year Award. Not only is The Public Trustee one of QCF's founding sponsors, but as the largest maker of Wills in the southern hemisphere, it is a major facilitator of bequests to the Foundation, supporting over 265 charities annually.

I wish to acknowledge and thank all QCF Board members, committee members, staff and our generous donors for their continued commitment, which will lead the Foundation into the future.

From the Board

This was a year of evaluation and reflection for Queensland Community Foundation (QCF). Our Chair, Dr de Groot, stepped aside after 10 years in the role and we said goodbye to Anglo American Coal, one of our key sponsors for 15 years. It was time to take stock of how far we have come and what our future focus will look like.

Anglo American Coal's long-term sponsorship contributed over \$1 million to meet QCF's operational costs. Their support, together with that of our founding sponsors, QIC and The Public Trustee, was integral to the Foundation's growth.

Following a strategic planning day, four major priorities were identified:

- Increase the size of the General Fund to provide more meaningful grants;
- Promote and increase Queenslanders' participation in philanthropy;
- Ensure QCF and its regional committees are funded, structured and resourced to meet the aims of the Mission Statement; and
- Through cooperation and collaboration, help Queenslanders in need.

The Board considered that what set QCF apart was its unique offering of no administration costs levied against donations, and that this value should be upheld. Consequently, we have re-positioned ourselves with QIC and The Public Trustee as founding sponsors, and have set out to seek bespoke sponsors to address key business objectives. With this focus, we were pleased to welcome QUT and the QUT Business School and its Australian Centre for Philanthropy and Nonprofit Studies as a major sponsor during QCF Philanthropy Week.

We also embarked on a re-invigorated collaboration with The Public Trustee, legal and financial practitioners, and the Queensland Law Society to strengthen our message of supporting social solutions in our community.

A concerted effort was made to engage the regions with their local donor communities. It was wonderful to see two of the QCF Philanthropist of the Year Awards going to the Sunshine Coast and Toowoomba regions. QCF Philanthropy Week continues to grow and provide opportunities for showcasing philanthropy in Queensland. Each year we are delighted with the participation of new partners and the engagement of the community in nominating deserving Queenslanders in the Awards.

We believe our grant-making values underpin what we do and are a key point of difference. We look forward to continuing to help charities build organisational capacity to assist with longevity and sustainability.

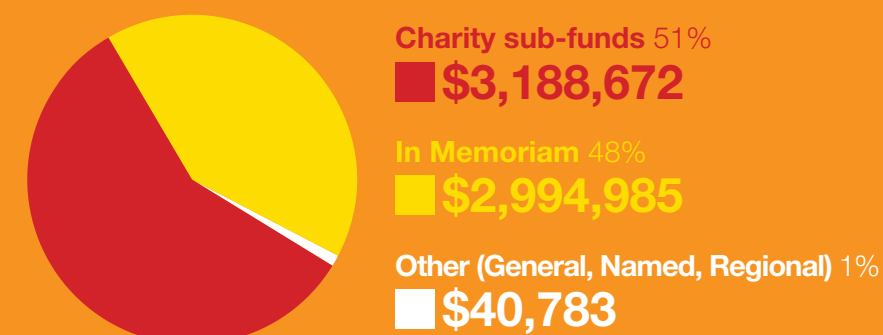

Give to the community

Our General Fund supports Queensland charities through an annual grant making program.

In partnership with QUT’s Centre for Philanthropy and Nonprofit Studies, Queensland Community Foundation (QCF) commissioned research to determine where best we could effectively make grants to meet areas of unmet need. The report identified organisational capacity building of charitable and non-profit organisations as key areas for development. QCF views itself as an innovator in this style of granting and is proud to continue to support the enhancement of charitable organisations’ core skills and resources.

Grants from the General Fund strengthen charities’ organisational capacity through the development of their structures, systems, people and skills, to deliver improved outcomes. Capacity is the key to effectiveness and typically focuses on education and training, recruiting, maintaining or recognising volunteers, information technology support systems and training, and planning and governance, which may include strategic plans, constitution reviews or board appraisals.

GingerCloud’s Modified Rugby Program gives children with a learning and perceptual disability the opportunity to play a team sport.

GingerCloud utilised a \$28,000 QCF General Fund grant to install an online portal. This will improve the scalability of the program and enable more communities, clubs, families and children to benefit from it.

Sub-funds in memoriam serve as a legacy and, through the creation of these sub-funds, we help donors honour a loved one by working with them to identify a charity or charitable cause they wish to support.

Funds from this Trust were utilised in the recent refurbishment of the outdoor area at the Caloundra Aged Care Facility. The refurbishment has transformed the area into a beautiful garden complete with pathways, shade sails and garden beds, which residents are encouraged to tend.

The area is now safe and welcoming for the residents and the garden will be a legacy to the donors on the Sunshine Coast who so strongly believe in Blue Care's vision of caring.

For donors who wish to support charities and causes in regions they have lived, we have a number of options including regional sub-funds for the Gold Coast, Sunshine Coast and Toowoomba.

These sub-funds provide sustainable income and enduring benefits for local charities and community organisations, thereby improving the efficacy of regional charitable giving by working with partners, donors, community leaders and charities to achieve positive social change locally.

Board-appointed regional advisory committees oversee the regional grants program and provide recommendations to the Trustee in relation to grant making.



Our Sunshine Coast sub-fund granted \$3,000 to Burnside High School's STEMM Program.

The first of its kind in Queensland, the Supporting Teenagers with Education, Mothering and Mentoring program is a unique, standalone curriculum supporting pregnant girls and young mothers in achieving their educational goals. The STEMM curriculum provides a program tailored around women's educational, social, physical and emotional needs in a non-judgemental environment.

Named sub-funds are a perfect way donors can put a name to their giving.

There is no cost to set up a sub-fund, and we take care of all the administration, compliance and reporting. Donors can work with us each year and put forward recommendations regarding the charity or charitable cause they wish to support.



The Renouf Family Fund was established by Sir Clem Renouf to provide ongoing support to a range of charitable community organisations, with a focus on alleviating problems associated with homelessness.

This year, the family chose to support two projects within the Specialist Homelessness Service run by United Synergies. They allocated funds specifically towards supporting people who are homeless by making available free and accessible showering and laundry facilities, and by funding driving lessons and driving licences to facilitate the transition to secure housing and independence for young people.

Speaking on behalf of his family, Noel Renouf said, "Our contribution is relatively small, but QCF provides us with an effective vehicle for giving targeted support to great work that is being done on the ground in our community."

Over the years, several of our sub-funds have been established either by charitable groups themselves or through generous bequests in Wills. These sub-funds provide a perpetual income stream for the charity, which will assist with long-term sustainability.

More than 100 charities have Queensland Community Foundation (QCF) sub-funds, ranging from organisations such as LawRight's Civil Justice Fund (CJF) to organisations such as QIMR Berghofer Medical Research Institute. Currently, the largest sub-fund in this group is Cancer Council Queensland (CCQ). Funds from QCF are invested into world-class cancer research through CCQ's Viertel Cancer Research Centre.



LawRight's CJF ensures access to the civil justice system for disadvantaged Queenslanders.

LawRight provides direct legal assistance to people experiencing homelessness or mental illness, refugees, young people transitioning from care, or self-represented litigants, to reduce their disadvantage.

Patron of the CJF, the Hon. Margaret McMurdo AC says, "Donations and bequests to the CJF sub-fund with QCF will ensure that the dream of quality access to civil justice for Queensland's most vulnerable becomes a reality. It really is the gift that keeps on giving to Queenslanders, forever."

QCF 2016-17 Grant *making*

This year, the General Fund grants round focused on small to medium charitable organisations servicing vulnerable populations needing to adapt their business model and systems to enable them to provide an improved and competitive service in the changing operating environment.

121 Care Inc \$26,336

The changes imposed by the implementation of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) will impact on upskilling 121 Care's service delivery. This will mean an investment in new technology, workforce, and governance training for their volunteer management committee.

Community Queensland Ltd \$30,000

Supporting up to 8,000 clients each month, Community Queensland will implement a time and attendance mobility application to support a portable and responsive workforce to meet the changing landscape of NDIS and Client Direct Aged Care.

Community Friends Ltd \$12,500

Community Friends' directors and volunteers will meet over a 12-month period to develop a strategic plan to strengthen the capacity of the organisation, allowing it to contribute to a stronger community.

Far North Queensland Hospital Foundation \$5,735

Far North Queensland Hospital Foundation is the fundraising arm of the Far North Queensland Hospital. It will utilise funding for a two-day team building workshop, a key component of which will be the identification and generation of fundraising ideas that can generate income over several years.

Foodbank Queensland Ltd \$21,390

With significant organisational changes, Foodbank Queensland requires a review of its CRM system. An audit and tailored strategy plan will ensure the organisation is getting the most from its current investment in people, processes and technology. The CRM system will be prepared for third-party integration of a fundraising system.

Suncoast Care \$9,077

Suncoast Care helps the most disadvantaged members of the community, with a major focus on solving the issue of food insecurity. The installation of a new Point of Sale system will improve accuracy and allow for faster scanning of goods, enabling greater flexibility with pricing and specials.

Ipswich Hospice Care Inc \$28,860

Ipswich Hospice Care Inc provides end-of-life palliative care for Ipswich and West Moreton residents. The 30-year-old constitution will be reviewed and essential staff trained in governance.

McIntyre Centre Riding for Disabled Ltd \$10,000

McIntyre's migration to a cloud-based Microsoft Office 365 package and its Sharepoint component will achieve an improved way of sharing information. The new intranet system and the ability to generate accurate online content will result in considerable timesaving and a reduction in the cost of IT maintenance.

Rosies Youth Mission Inc \$30,000

Rosies relies on digital systems to maintain cohesion, timely information and communication. An upgrade to current technologies, particularly integration and mobile access to applications, will enable the organisation to operate efficiently and effectively for the next five to 10 years.

Sonshine Sanctuary Association Inc \$6,640

A crisis accommodation service offering support and advocacy to women and children made homeless by domestic and family violence, Sonshine Sanctuary will undertake an audit to ensure capacity to meet with the legislation and will review policies and procedures.



McIntyre Centre Riding for Disabled Ltd.

Speld Queensland \$19,469

To sustain and expand services, Speld Queensland will boost the capacity of their internet and other information technology platforms to provide a reliable, agile and sustainable IT interface with families, clients, supporting organisations and the public.

Suited to Success Inc \$30,000

With a complex environment, knowledge management is a key challenge for Suited to Success. An integrated client relationship management system will be installed to meet a fundamental business need to efficiently capture real-time data improving governance and transparency.

YFS Ltd \$25,000

YFS delivers services to help people experiencing poverty or overcoming challenges. YFS will partner with Kingston East Neighbourhood Group and Beaucare to explore the creation of an umbrella organisational governance model to improve the viability and effectiveness of participating organisations.

QCF Philanthropy Week 2017

To launch QCF Philanthropy Week 2017, His Excellency The Honourable Paul de Jersey AC, Governor of Queensland, held a reception at Government House. One hundred and twenty-five distinguished guests attended the launch.

Supporting Events

As part of QCF Philanthropy Week, we invite leading organisations within the non-profit sector to hold events to encourage and further philanthropy. 2017 saw Philanthropy Australia hold two workshops – Grant Writing Essentials and Impact Investing Essentials.

The Funding Network's annual Brisbane event saw over \$100,000 pledged to Health Justice Australia, Share the Dignity and Hope Centre Services. And QUT Business School's Australian Centre for Philanthropy and Nonprofit Studies held a free webinar that explored giving in Queensland.

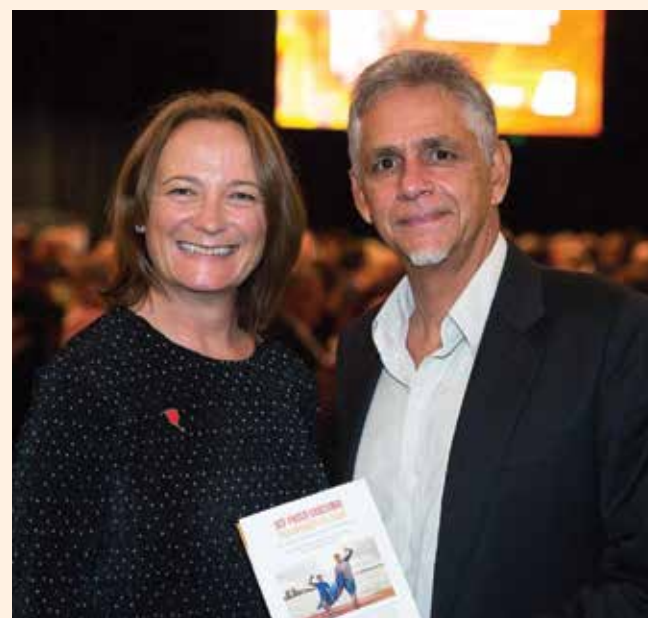

All donations are pooled and invested. We keep track of all aspects of the donation, including capital and income, investment earnings and grants attributed. It is cost-effective and there is no administrative burden on donors.

Donors can be involved by recommending the areas, organisations, or specific projects they would like us to support and can change recommendations every year. We handle all the administration, compliance and reporting measures, and prudently invest to generate income and long-term capital growth.

Currently, we have 217 sub-funds supporting a variety of causes.

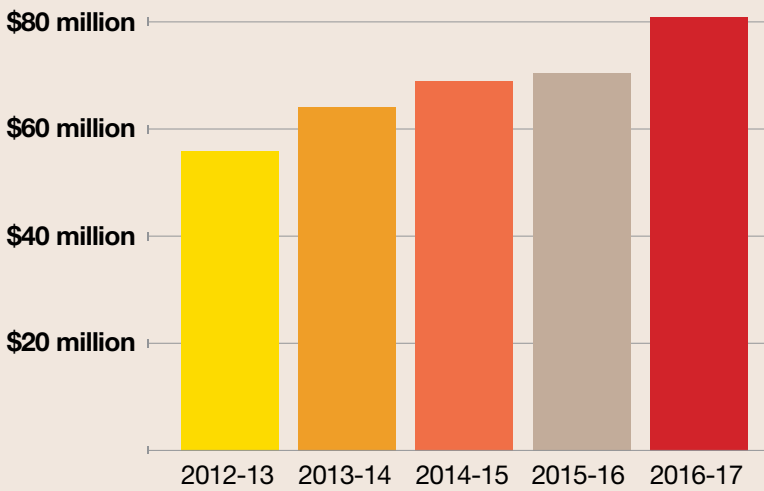

Financial Summary 2016-17

Revenue and Growth

The Queensland Community Foundation Trust Fund grew by 15% during the 2017 financial year, bringing QCF's net assets to almost \$80.7 million. This growth was primarily driven by donations into the fund and net gains in the Public Trustee of Queensland Growth Trust.

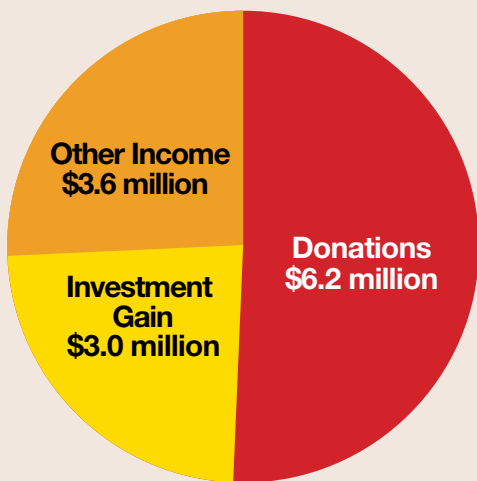


Income

In 2016-17, income generated increased significantly from the previous financial year as a result of higher donations, distributions income and improved investment performance.

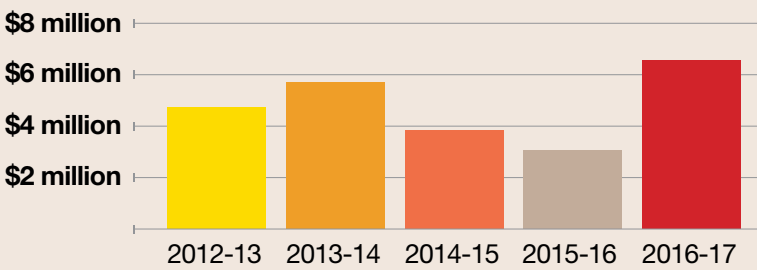
2016-17 saw a \$3.0 million net gain in the market value of the Foundation's investment in The Public Trustee Growth Trust compared to a loss of \$1.2 million in the previous year.

Other income was also significantly higher at \$3.6m (2016: \$2.1m) which includes Growth Trust distributions of \$2.8 million (2016: \$1.4 million).



Donations

Donations received increased in the 2017 financial year by 96.3% to \$6.2 million.



Investment Performance

The investment strategy for QCF is reviewed on an annual basis in conjunction with advice from QIC. The strategy is designed to achieve QCF's stated investment objective to 'maximise income while maintaining the real capital value of the funds after considering the effects of inflation'. The investments of the Foundation are a composite mix, comprising of 20% in the cash sector and 80% in the Public Trustee Growth Trust.

Prior to 7 April 2017, the investment strategy of the Growth Trust comprised investments in a number of unlisted unit trusts managed by QIC. The investments in these unit trusts provided exposure to Australian equities, international equities, fixed interest, global property, cash and absolute return strategies asset classes.

A review of the investment strategy was conducted in consultation with an independent financial advisor. Following the review, it was determined to change the investment strategy so that the Trust invests primarily in the QIC Growth Fund with a small investment (approximately 1% of the Trust) in the QIC Cash Enhanced Fund to manage liquidity. The transition to the revised investment strategy was completed on 7 April 2017.

The investment objective of the Trust is to provide a fully diversified investment strategy seeking long-term income and capital growth. As a result of the change in investment strategy outlined above, the investment objective of the Growth Trust changed from generating average returns (net of fees and costs) of CPI + 1.9% over rolling 10-year periods to CPI + 2.4% per annum over rolling five-year periods.

The investment strategy returned 8.93% (after management fees, but before Trustee Fee Rebate) for the 12-month period ended 30 June 2017. The income component of the return, including realised capital gains, was 4.51%.

QCF Governance

Queensland Community Foundation (QCF) is a public ancillary fund formed under a single Trust Deed and is intended to continue in perpetuity.

The Public Trustee of Queensland, as Trustee of QCF, is responsible for the administration, investment and granting of funds and the determination of distributions from the fund. The Trustee is assisted in its role by a Board of Governors who makes recommendations as to the allocation of income. The Board of Governors is a voluntary board of professionals with expertise in identifying community needs.

The day-to-day operational costs associated with the administration of the Foundation are met by corporate sponsorship. This sponsorship ensures no administration costs are levied against donations. QCF Management Co. Ltd, a public company limited by guarantee, was established by the founding sponsors QIC, The Public Trustee and Anglo American Coal to manage financial and other contributions.
